Prescription Drug Assistance Information

PATIENT/FAMILY INFORMATION SHEET

What information will this handout provide regarding prescription coverage?

The soaring cost of prescription medications has affected most people who require maintenance drug therapy. Those individuals who live on fixed incomes and do not have prescription coverage are particularly affected by the rising costs. This handout is intended as a guide for those who need information on ways to help pay for their prescription drugs. Greenwich Hospital does not endorse any of the listed programs.

When researching different programs, consider the following points:

- Speak with your doctor and/or pharmacist before choosing a prescription drug plan. They may be able to recommend a program that best fits your needs depending upon the medications you are taking.
- You may be able to substitute brand name medications with less expensive generic medications. Check with your doctor when receiving a new prescription to determine if the generic form would be suitable for you.
- Consider whether the plan covers regular pharmacies and/or mail order programs. Pharmacies are necessary for short-term and/or acute care prescriptions that are needed right away. For long-term or maintenance drugs, mail order programs may provide you with greater cost savings. Some prescription plans offer both of these options and some do not.
- Shop around for best prices. If you are paying out-of-pocket for your prescription medications, shop for pharmacies that offer the best prices.
- Drug companies sponsor special programs for people who cannot afford the cost of their brand name prescription drugs. You may be eligible to receive medications free-of-charge or at a very low cost depending upon your income level and health condition.

NeedyMeds is an internet-based resource that contains information on over 300 pharmaceutical drug company programs. These programs provide medicine at no cost or low cost to those who qualify. For those who do not have or use a computer, access may be available from family, friends, your local public library, and/or a local community group such as a senior center.

> There are also disease-specific programs that help people with certain longterm illnesses/conditions to obtain prescription medications.
